Dear Mr. Windes:

We have reviewed the Multiyear Implementation Plan (Multiyear Plan) Amendment #1 from Okaloosa County which was submitted on October 10, 2019 and deemed complete on October 25, 2019. We find that the Okaloosa County Multiyear Plan Amendment #1 is complete and appears to conform to the RESTORE Act and regulations. As of the date of this letter, Treasury accepts Okaloosa County's Multiyear Plan Amendment #1, which includes three new projects (Choctawhatchee Bay Estuary Program, Stormwater Program (Design and Permitting), and Road Stabilization Program) for a total of \$11,615,902.39 of the funds available in Okaloosa County's allocation in the Gulf Coast Restoration Trust Fund (Trust Fund). The County can begin to submit applications through [GrantSolutions.gov](https://www.grantsolutions.gov) for Direct Component funding to support the activities included in the accepted Multiyear Plan.

We will post all accepted Multiyear Plans on Treasury's RESTORE Act website. In addition, please post the Multiyear Plan Amendment #1 on your County website and provide us with the web address so we can include the link on the Treasury RESTORE Act website.

Treasury's acceptance of Multiyear Plan Amendment #1 is not a final determination of the eligibility of activities, projects, and programs for Direct Component funding and does not bind Treasury to obligate funds from the Trust Fund. The County must submit applications for Direct Component funding separately through [GrantSolutions.gov](https://www.grantsolutions.gov). Treasury will review these applications to determine if the requested funding complies with the RESTORE Act and regulations, and Federal law and policies on grants. Applicants may submit applications only to seek funds already available for distribution from the Trust Fund, in accordance with allocations established under the statute.

In the future, whenever there is a material change in the Multiyear Plan, Okaloosa County must follow the requirements for an initial Multiyear Plan, including those for public review and comment. For more information, see the RESTORE Act Direct Component Guidance on the RESTORE Act website.
